"At present he is attending Northern Baptist Seminary where he is completing his graduate work toward the Doctor of Theology degree in the field of Old Testament and Hebrew."


Hazel Green Smith, ex-'39, Cookeville, Tennessee

"So far we have contacted about 1250 children. . . We have been pleased with the response of the children. . .

"Thelma has become quite a talker and Norman has learned to walk a little. Paul built them a special seat in the truck and they go to schools with us and play there while we are busy."

"There seems to come a time in the life of every Christian when we have to stop and wait for the Lord to open doors and give the green light and that is about what we are doing now. The folks in Africa have made arrangements for our stuff to go inland from the coast and so we are shipping it out in a week. We hope to get there about the same time, but as yet we know nothing of a sailing date. The boat company said that our party might get out in November, but they will not tell us anything definite until about the middle of the month. About the only thing that we can do is to pray, and in the end that always seems to be the best thing to do anyway.

"We are all in good health and are raring to go. Anna Kay will be four months old next week and she weighs 15 lbs. and is getting to the place where she can sit up by herself and has a very definite mind of her own.

"It is our prayer always that God will bless Bryan and make of it the school that it could and should grow to be. Thank you all for the BRYANETTE that we have been receiving. It has meant much to us in keeping us up with other roamers. . . .

"I have been learning more of the printing trade from the printer here in town who is a good Christian friend."

"Stetson is really great! We have a wonderful school of music. I'm taking piano, voice, organ, theory, choral conducting and aviation flight lessons. I didn't have any time left for the Chemistry and dramatics I wanted. I'm here on a scholarship. . . . Very fortunate I am, and most grateful to Him for answered prayer. . . . I enjoy being choir conductor for the 1st Methodist Episcopal church here. Our choir is composed mostly of college students.

"Flying is really thrilling. I've never loved anything more. I had my first stalls last time. They almost took my breath away. We fly Taylorcrafts. . . .

"After those years at Bryan, winter here is a let-down. . . . What I wouldn't give to hike to Laurel Falls again and climb around on those huge rocks. . . .

"Our glee club here is excellent, with a hundred select voices. . . . I am one of the 2 accompanists for the chorus, as they call it. Some of the selections they feature are extremely difficult. We give the Messiah soon. Playing that is some task!

"Love to all the Bryan family, and tell the Major that it's his turn next for a letter to me. Don't keep him so busy that he has to neglect his ex-headaches."

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Cpl. J. Warren Wynkoop, ex'44, GERMANY

" . . . I have thought a lot about Bryan and the fun we used to have there, especially lately, for many of the kids have come to me to ask if they should take advantage of the G.I. Bill of Rights and go back to college or start when they get home.

"Most of the men of this battalion who are not replacements like myself, have far more than the necessary 35 points to return home. I only have 67, for I did not come in until Cassino. My points came the hard way, from five major campaigns. . . .

"This battalion is going home, but my orders have already come through to report to an engineer regiment in the vicinity of Kasel for occupation. . . .

"My orders read that I am not to report 'until present duties are completed.' My present duties are to complete a 150,000 word book with 600 photographs and 60 cartoons and paintings that is on the press now at University of Heidelberg print shop. It is a battalion history for the men of the battalion, and the first edition has already been oversubscribed. . . .

"I have been overseas 25 months now, 18 of them in combat, and I am getting a little anxious to try my English again. I can talk in Arabic, Italian, French, and German, but my English is slipping."

The article by Miss Batson entitled, 'The Christian College and the Social Challenge' was especially good, I thought. The Alumni News and On the Campus columns are always interesting to me for it lets me know what my friends and acquaintances made at Bryan are doing. More than that, it is just a little touch of home to me.

"It was with some regret that I learned of Dr. Cole's passing, for it had been my anticipation of being in one of his classes upon my return to school. No doubt our gracious Lord is showing him greater mysteries and wonders than those his science dealt with.

"There is some talk around here of our evacuating China by the end of Dec. . . .
